Funeral services were held for John B. Pederson, 72, Freeman, S. Dak., on Thursday, Dec. 16th, at 1:30 from the home and at 2 o'clock from Bangs Lutheran Church. Rev. John Helgeson of the Midway Parish officiated. Pianist was Mrs. Jorgen Brakvatne, and soloists were Mrs. Elmer Larsen. who sang "Beyond the Sunset", and Curtis Andersen, who sang "Behold A Host Arrayed in White" and "Safe In The Arms of Jesus". Pallbearers were six nephews: Lawrence Wek, Andrew Wek, Reuben Jenson, Howard Pederson, Wilbur Foss and Kenneth Gullickson. Interment was in Bangs Lutheran Church cemetery. The Viborg Funeral Home had charge of arrangements.

John Berger Pederson, son of Ole I. and Johnanna Pederson, was born July 4th, 1882, in Starheim, Norway, and baptized in the Lutheran Starheim's Eids Church in Norway. He came to America with his parents at the age of four years.

In the year of 1898 he was confirmed by Rev. Bruch in the Bangs Lutheran Church, to which he was a faithful and devout member.

On February 14, 1909, he was united in marriage to Anna Jorstad, daughter of Peter and Ottine Jorstad of Freeman, S. Dak., at the Jorstad home by Rev. John Levorson.

To this union were born five children: Olga (Mrs. Joseph Gran): Helen (Mrs. Leonard Holm), both of Viborg; Oliver of Irene, and Peder at home.
